Order of Service

Welcome

Welcome to Evensong in New College Chapel. Archbishop Thomas Cranmer devised this service in 1549, fusing the monastic services of Vespers and Compline into a 'common' form of prayer for all Christians.

The introduction to evensong in the 1928 prayer book sums up what we are doing in this service: we offer our worship and praise and thanksgiving, we confess our sins, we pray for others and for ourselves, and we 'ask on behalf of all men such things as their well-being doth require'. In other words, we examine in love all that we need and all that we are, setting aside the cares of the world to reflect in the calm and stillness of the chapel. May you find hope and peace in this place where prayer has been valid for more than six centuries.

All members of college are very welcome at chapel services and this term they are just for you; we hope that it won't be long before you are able to bring friends and family. For the time being they can watch Sunday services on the [New College Choir channel on YouTube](#). This term our regular services with music will be:

Saturdays and Sundays, 5.45 evensong with the choristers

Tuesdays, 9.00pm Compline. 20 minutes of sublime music by the men of the choir, with a glass of prosecco or elderflower to ease the end of your day

Thursdays, 5.45 Sung Eucharist. The traditional service of mass, sung by the men of the choir

There is also a short simple service of daily prayer in the chapel at noon on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays.

There will be more information later in term about services for the Remembrance season and Christmas.
